
## **Adolescent Parenting Program**

### **What is the Adolescent Parenting Program?**

The Adolescent Parenting Program is open to Lincoln County residents under the age of 21 with a child or children aged birth through five. It provides support and services at no charge.

Part of the program includes peer group meetings, which helps teens with education, helps build self-esteem, and helps with social skills. Each peer group meeting has a different topic, which may include guest speakers.

The program also offers home visits every month, which help the parents with goal setting, parenting, education, independence and employment. Transportation is also available to help with local doctor's appointments and appointments at the Employment Security commission.

Many of the parents are referrals from the Department of Social Services and the school system but everyone is welcome!

The program is funded through the Partnership for Children of Lincoln & Gaston Counties.

#### LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & BOARD CHAIR

#### **Dear Champions of our Children and Families**

It is an honor to share with you, our stakeholders and community partners, the results of our programs and some of the key strategic initiatives that the Partnership for Children of Lincoln and Gaston Counties has undertaken during the 2012-2013 fiscal year. Our programs are designed to help children served reach their full health and educational potential by the time they enter into kindergarten. We hope this information will attest to our commitment to our community's children aged birth (0) to five (5) and their families.

In an effort to enhance the Partnership's governance process, our Board of Directors decided to change to an optional governance model approved by the North Carolina Partnership for Children (NCPC). This optional model will provide greater flexibility in meeting the needs of the children and families served. Board membership will continue to represent local government, services and business/community. A complete review of our Bylaws is underway currently to accommodate the changes necessitated by this new model of governance.

The Performance-Based Incentive System (PBIS) are measures of child well-being for which local Smart Start Partnerships are held accountable by NCPC. An area identified for improvement in our last year's PBIS Report is lead teacher education in child care centers and homes. Accordingly, our Board of Directors decided to enhance our Quality Sustainability Program with additional funding to support financial incentives for teachers to pursue higher education. Desired results include higher lead teacher education levels, greater teacher retention, and higher quality of education in our child care centers and homes.

A study was commissioned by our Board of Directors to evaluate employee job classifications and compensation levels relative to duties/responsibilities and the rates currently paid in the marketplace. As a result of this study, a new market competitive Compensation Plan was approved for all employees.

Leadership development has also been a key strategic focus this year. Executive Director Michael Linker participated in a Leaders' Collaborative sponsored by NCPC that included intensive training over an eight (8) month period and consisting of a three (3) day training commitment each month. This experience led to two community projects including an Equity Retreat and the development of a task force to address the disparity in our community's infant mortality.

There are only 2000 days from a child's birth to the time he/she enters kindergarten. We all know that getting things right the first time is easier and more effective than trying to fix them later.

Thank you for your partnership in this most important endeavor.

#### **PFCLG 2012-2013 AT A GLANCE...**

#### How many children?

- \* As of June 2013, there are an estimated 22,076 children aged 0-5 in Lincoln and Gaston Counties
- \* As of June 30, 2013, an estimated 5,159 children aged 0-5 attend licensed child care in Lincoln and Gaston Counties. 75 percent of those were in 4 or 5 star facilities.

#### **HOW DID WE HELP?**

We helped child care facilities achieve and maintain higher standard of care

- \* 57 child care facilities received Technical Assistance on health, nutrition, sanitation and safety.
- \* There were 3,628 children enrolled in facilities being served by Child Care Health Consultants in Lincoln and Gaston Counties
- \* 104 child care facilities received Technical Assistance on environmental rating scales and general licensure through our Child Care Health Consultant and QE and QS programs. This served 371 classrooms with children 0-5.

#### We helped support the education of child care providers.

- \* 80 Child care providers in 45 child care facilities earned financial incentives for earning college credit impacting 2,500 children through our IPDP program.
- ★ 93 child care professionals working in 57 facilities earned a WAGE\$ supplement

#### We helped families improve their parenting skills

\* 114 families received parenting help through our family support services.

#### We helped improve awareness and enrollment in health services

\* 42 providers in 12 practices received updated information regarding early intervention including screening and referral processes.
