Joins Partnership Board**

After assuming his duties as executive director of Communities in Schools of Lincoln County on May 1, Billy Marsh joined the Partnership's Board of Directors.

CIS serves at-risk students in Lincoln County Schools. The program currently operates in middle schools as an elective class and students are referred by teachers, principals, guidance counselors or other sources. CIS is responsible for the Support Our Students after-school program and Sun-

rise Family Resource Center, which offers programs to the community that vary from cooking skills to literacy.

CIS works to see that all students have a one-on-one relationship with a caring adult, a safe place to learn and grow, a marketable skill, a chance to give back to peers and the community, a healthy start and a healthy future.

Marsh, a native and lifelong resident of Lincoln, has been married for eight years. He and his wife, Stephanie, have two

Smart Start helps more than 140 teachers of young children with education through IPDP

More than 140 child care workers will receive help with paying for their college educations because of the the Partnership for Children's Individual Professional Development Plan.

The IPDP reimburses child care professionals who are currently in college pursuing degrees in early childhood education. Program participants must have declared a major as early childhood education and must be working at least 20 hours per week in an early childhood program while attending classes.

Teachers who participated in the program were recognized June 17 at the Gaston County Public Library.

Dr. Janet Johnston, director of curriculum at Hope Lutheran School, which is slated to open in Gastonia in the next few months, was the keynote speaker.

Johnston spoke on the importance of persistence when pursuing a college degree, no matter how long it may take.

"What it says to your children is, 'I finish what I start,'" she said.

Johnston said it's also important to recognize that a student cannot complete a degree without support from family, friends and the community.

"You have support from the Partnership or you wouldn't be here tonight," Johnston said.

JUST FOR PARENTS

Summer Project: Miniature Greenhouse

It's easy to build a miniature greenhouse with your kids, and it's a learning process that will last all summer! Here's what you'll need to get started:

- A large glass jar with a wide mouth and a screw-on lid
- A few handfuls of gravel or small pebbles
- A small amount of potting mix or garden soil
- An empty tuna can
- Hammer and nail
- Plant seedlings

Directions:

Parents should use the hammer and nail to poke three holes in the bottom of the tuna can for drainage.

Put one layer of gravel or pebbles in the can and then fill the can up with potting mix or garden soil.

Moisten the soil. Carefully trans-

plant the seedlings into the soil. Place the taller plants in the middle of the can and the shorter ones around the outside.

Place the tuna can with planted seedlings on top of the jar lid. The inside of the lid should be facing up, and the sides of the lid should form a basin for the water to drain

into. Invert the glass jar and screw it onto the lid.

Place your miniature greenhouse in *indirect* sunlight and water when the plants start to wilt. Replace seedlings which die or become too tall.

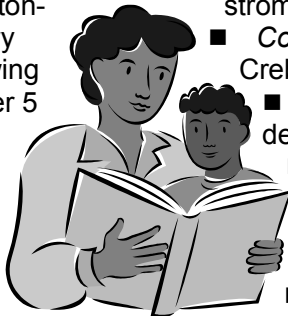

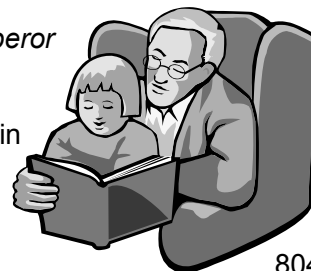
